

Kansas Historic Sites Board of Review
February 25, 1995
Kansas Museum of History, Topeka, KS

The meeting was called to order at 9:30 a.m. by the chair Judith Major. Other board members present were Tom Barr, J. David DeBusman, Terry J. Clark, Herchel Crainer, Tom Groneman, Jeanne McKenna, Ramon Powers, Mark Sheeks, Tom Witty, and Cooper Woodring. Staff members of the Historic Preservation Office (HPO) present were Dick Pankratz, Sandy McDaniel, Desmond Anyanwu, Martha Hagedorn-Krass, Carl Magnuson, Kim Rivera, Courtney Swann, and Barry Williams. Approximately forty members of the public were also in attendance.

The chair asked the board members to identify themselves and to state which discipline they represented. She then asked HPO staff to identify themselves and their positions and explained to the audience the process the board uses for the consideration of nominations.

Herchel Crainer moved to accept the minutes of the November 5, 1994, meeting; Judith Major seconded the motion and it carried.

An update on preservation activities since the November board meeting was next on the agenda. There have been two additions to the National Register since the November meeting--the Bank of Oberlin, Oberlin, and the Snokomo School, Wabaunsee County. The total is now 629. HPO staff has been assisting the Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT) again this year with evaluating the ISTEA enhancement projects in the historic category. An announcement is expected in March of the projects that were selected for funding for this round of grants. KDOT has been allocated funds for the ISTEA program through FY 97, but the future of the grant program is unclear.

Courtney Swann gave an update on Heritage Trust Fund projects to date. Of the eleven 1993 grants, three are complete and three are under construction; of the eleven 1994 grants, three projects are under construction. Approximately thirty preliminary applications for the upcoming 1995 round of grants have been reviewed.

Carl Magnuson reported on the Historic Preservation Fund grants. The last of the 1993 grants were closed out and products were accepted. Those projects completed are: the Downtown Lawrence survey; the second phase of the Garden City survey; the Johnson County Museum System survey; and the University of Kansas Museum of Anthropology research guide. Grants completed for 1994 are: the Neodesha Main Street Downtown survey and the City of White Cloud nomination of a historic district.

Martha Hagedorn-Krass gave an update on the status of the Elk River Marsh Arch Bridge in Independence. A local group called Friends of the Elk River Bridge has been formed to generate support for the bridge. The group intends to bring the National Register nomination of the bridge before the review board in May.

Ramon Powers updated the board on legislative matters concerning the Historical Society. He reported on the progress of construction at the new research center building. Research center staff should be starting the move to the new facility some time in June. The official opening of the research center is scheduled for October 6,7,8 of this year. The Potawatomi Indian Mission remodeling funded by Koch Industries has been completed.

Next on the agenda was the consideration of whether the Calvary Baptist Church at 601 N. Water, Wichita, Sedgwick County, could be relocated to a site at or near 619 N. Main and remain listed on the National Register. Martha presented information about the move and HPO staff's opinion on the matter. Staff thought that it was technically feasible to move the building but that the location Sedgwick County has chosen would be detrimental to the church's National Register listing status. Staff suggested that three other corner locations near the original site be considered.

Sedgwick County representatives then presented their proposal to the board. Bill Buchanan gave the board a brief overview of the procedures the county undertook in order to bring the move proposal before the board. Lyman Reese of the Adult Detention Facility spoke about the need for more space at the detention facility thus precipitating the need for the relocation of the Calvary Baptist Church. Pete Friessen, an expert in moving buildings, briefed the board on how the move would occur, and Joe Johnson and Bill Buchanan gave a presentation on the orientation of the building and the amount of sunlight that would reach the stained glass windows at the new location on N. Main.

The public was allowed to comment on the proposal. Reverend Andrew Simpson, president of the First National Black Historical Society, spoke in opposition to the Sedgwick County proposal. Brian Persha, a concerned citizen of Wichita, also spoke in opposition to the proposal. Sedgwick County proponents fielded questions from the board about the proposal.

Jeanne McKenna made a motion that if the Calvary Baptist Church were relocated to the site proposed by Sedgwick County it would not retain its National Register listing; Judith Major seconded the motion. Those voting yes were Tom Witty, Tom Barr, Jeanne McKenna, Tom Groneman, and Judith Major. Those voting no were Mark Sheeks, Cooper Woodring, David DeBusman, Herchel Crainer, and Terry Clark. Ramon Powers abstained. The vote being a 5 to 5 tie, the motion failed.

After more discussion Judith Major made a motion that if the Calvary Baptist Church was moved anywhere it would not retain its National Register listing; Tom Witty seconded the motion. Those in favor of the motion were Tom Barr, Tom Witty, Judith Major, and Jeanne McKenna. Those voting no were Tom Groneman, Cooper Woodring, David DeBusman, Mark Sheeks, Terry Clark, Herchel Crainer, and Ramon Powers. The motion failed by a 7 to 4 vote.

Herchel Crainer then made a motion that if the building were moved to the N. Main site as the county had presented in its proposal the church would retain its National Register listing status; David DeBusman seconded the motion. Those voting in favor of the motion were Cooper Woodring, David DeBusman, Ramon Powers, Herchel Crainer, Terry Clark, and Mark Sheeks. Those voting against the motion were Tom Witty, Tom Barr, Tom Groneman, Judith Major, and Jeanne McKenna. The motion carried by a 6 to 5 vote.

A ten minute break was taken.

Martha Hagedorn-Krass then presented nominations to the board for consideration to the national and state register. All nominations were unanimously accepted unless otherwise indicated.

Kansas Historic Sites Board of Review
May 13, 1995
Kansas Museum of History, Topeka, KS

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 a.m. by the Chair Judith Major. Other board members present were Tom Barr, J. David DeBusman, Terry J. Clark, Herchel Crainer, Ramon Powers, Tom Witty, and Cooper Woodring. Board members absent were J. Eric Engstrom, Tom Groneman, and Jeanne McKenna. Staff members of the Historic Preservation Office (HPO) present were Dick Pankratz, Sandy McDaniel, Martha Hagedorn-Krass, Larry Jochims, Carl Magnuson, and Courtney Swann. Interested members of the public were also in attendance.

Chairman Major informed the board that Mark Sheeks had been replaced by J. Eric Engstrom from Wichita as the Governor's designee. Mr. Engstrom is an attorney and had previously served on the board for sixteen years. Members of the board and HPO staff were then asked to identify themselves to the public.

Herchel Crainer moved to accept the minutes of the February 25, 1995, meeting; Judith Major seconded the motion and it carried.

An update on preservation activities since the February board meeting was next on the agenda. Properties that have been recently added to the National Register of Historic Places are: 1) William A. Quayle House, Baldwin; 2) Engine House No. 6, Wichita; 3) Emerson Coulson House, Abilene; 4) Mount Barbara, Salina; 5) Babbitt-Doerr House, Larned; 6) Douglass Township Community Building, Douglass. At the present time a total of 634 Kansas properties are on the National Register.

The Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT) has announced the third-round selection of enhancement projects that will receive Intermodal Surface Transportation Enhancement Act (ISTEA) funds. In the historic category, the following projects were selected: (1) the Archeology Office of the Kansas State Historical Society--funds for continuing the geomorphological studies for two more KDOT districts-\$72,000; (2) Dodge City--a second award for the Santa Fe Depot renovation project, a major part of which will be the rehabilitation of the Harvey House dormitory-\$500,000; (3) City of Enterprise--funds for the Abilene and Smoky Valley Railroad Association for the acquisition and repair of track between Enterprise and Woodbine for operation of a tourist railroad-\$194,000; (4) City of Madison--funds for the interior renovation of the Santa Fe Depot-\$50,000; (5) Franklin County--funds for the rehabilitation of the Santa Fe Depot at Ottawa-\$514,000.

The Governor's Awards for Historic Preservation ceremony will be held on May 17, 1995, at the Koch Education Center on the museum grounds at 9:30 a.m. The governor will sign a proclamation for Historic Preservation Week, the theme of which is "Real People, Real Places, Real History." The three recipients of this year's awards are Bernd Foerster, Manhattan; Reverend Richard Taylor, Topeka; and St. Marys Church at St. Benedict. Board members were invited to attend the ceremony.

Ramon Powers informed the board members that the Koch Education Center was officially opened on May 12, 1995.

Consideration of the Heritage Trust Fund committee recommendations was next on the agenda. Judith Major presented the committee's report and recommendations. Courtney Swann then gave a slide presentation of the recommended projects. Questions and discussion from the board members followed. Dave DeBusman moved to accept the committee recommendations; Terry Clark seconded, and it carried. Those projects receiving Heritage Trust Fund grants for 1995 are as follows:

Herchel Crainer reported on the move of the Calvary Baptist Church in Wichita. He is on the committee to oversee the move of the church to its new location. Herchel has recommended that when the moving contractor is chosen, they contact the HPO in regard to historic preservation techniques. The National Park Service will review the nomination after the move is completed.

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Cooper Woodring informed the board members that Historic Topeka, Inc. has asked him to be involved in the removal and disposition of historic fabric from the First National Bank Building at 535 Kansas Ave., Topeka. Cooper hopes to keep most of the historic fabric in the Topeka community.

REPORT OF THE 1995 HERITAGE TRUST FUND GRANT REVIEW COMMITTEE

On March 29 the Heritage Trust Fund Grant Review Committee, which is composed of Cooper Woodring, Thomas Groneman, and myself, Judith Major, was given a presentation by Kansas Historic Preservation Office staff concerning the 1995 grant applications for the Heritage Trust Fund. During the meeting the staff members showed slides of the properties and provided brief descriptions of the projects. The committee members were then given copies of the applications for review. A summary of this year's applications is attached as an addendum to your copy of this report. On April 21, 1995 the committee met again to discuss its final rankings and to prepare a list of recommendations to the board. The committee received 45 applications requesting a total of \$2,374,576 in grant funds. Employing the criteria stated in the legislation that created the fund, the committee ranked the applications and funded as many as the available resources would allow. All told, \$556,090 was awarded to fourteen properties across the state. Following is the list of properties recommended for funding in the 1995 round of Heritage Trust Fund grants. They are listed in alphabetical order according to the property's name.

We also have recommended projects involving a prairie style house in an urban neighborhood and a cemetery dating to the mission experience of the Delaware tribe. In addition to representing a wide variety of properties, the projects are located in a number of different environments distributed across the state. The maps attached to this report provide an idea of the distribution of the recommended projects.

Summaries of the recommended projects are listed on the two pages which follow this report. We hope these projects meet with your approval and that you will choose to endorse our recommendations to the Executive Director of the Kansas State Historical Society.

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 a.m. by Dick Pankratz, Director of the Historic Preservation Office, in the absence of the chair Judith Major. Board members present were Terry J. Clark, Herchel Crainer, Craig Crosswhite, J. David DeBusman, J. Eric Engstrom, Jeanne McKenna, and Tom Witty. Absent board members were Tom Barr, Tom Groneman, Judith Major, and Ramon Powers. Staff members of the Historic Preservation Office (HPO) present were Dick Pankratz, Sandy McDaniel, Desmond Anyanwu, Martha Hagedorn-Krass, and Carl Magnuson. Interested members of the public were also in attendance.

Dick informed the board that Dr. Powers had named him as his designee for this meeting; however, at this meeting he served as staff and not as a board member. Dick introduced two new board members--Craig Crosswhite and J. Eric Engstrom. Mr. Crosswhite, an attorney from Jetmore, replaced Cooper C. Woodring as a public member; he had served part of a term on the board about five years ago. Mr. Engstrom, an attorney from Wichita, replaced Mark Sheeks as the Governor's designee; he had previously served on the board for 16 years. Members of the board and HPO staff were then asked to identify themselves to the public.

Approval of the May 13, 1995, minutes was next on the agenda. Herchel Crainer stated that he wanted the minutes to reflect his comments that the Heritage Trust Fund grant awards were slanted toward the northeastern part of the state. Eric Engstrom moved to accept the May minutes with that addition; Mr. Crainer seconded the motion, and it carried.

Dick presented an update on preservation activities since the May board meeting. The historical society has moved into its new facility at 6425 SW Sixth Ave. since that meeting. A considerable amount of time and energy was expended in August and September packing, moving, and unpacking at the new location.

Twenty-one properties have been added to the national register since the May board meeting, raising the Kansas total to 655 listings. Historic Preservation staff are preparing to circulate to eligible cities a proposal that would implement an amendment made to the state historic preservation law. Under that law the state historic preservation officer could transfer to eligible local governments part or all of his review responsibilities in that community. At the present time the five Certified Local Government (CLG) cities would qualify. Interest in possible preservation ordinances has surfaced in a number of other communities--Abilene, Manhattan, Junction City, and Doniphan County. Staff is working with them as they explore ordinance possibilities.

HPO staff held a workshop for members of the local landmark commissions and their staffs on September 9. Representatives came from all of the CLG cities, including all of the local preservation staff. Many of the local commission members were gratified at the similarities of views and positions among the different community representatives.

Sedgwick County has apparently agreed not to move Calvary Baptist Church and will design the jail addition around the church. The state historic preservation officer (SHPO) has not yet received any official word on the project from Sedgwick County. The project will have to be reviewed by the SHPO under state statute, and the local landmarks commission will also evaluate the project and give the SHPO a recommendation.

Tom Witty, chair of the Historic Preservation Fund grants review committee, presented the committee's recommendation for the 1996 round of federal grants. The Kansas preservation office has not yet received official notification of its federal appropriation. The grants review committee, therefore, ranked the applications according to the stated criteria. Those applicants were ranked as follows:

City of Lawrence, West Lawrence Reconnaissance Inventory Surveys and Residential
Thematic Nomination Context Statements
City of Wichita, "Wichita Lost and Found" Video, and "Historic Landmarks" Brochure

(A minimum of ten per cent of the gross federal appropriation is reserved for CLG projects.) Eric Engstrom moved to adopt the committee's recommendation; Jeanne McKenna seconded the motion, and it carried.

Election of officers was next on the agenda. Tom Witty nominated Eric Engstrom for chairman; Jeanne McKenna seconded the nomination, and it carried. David DeBusman nominated Herchel Crainer for vice-chairman; Terry Clark seconded the nomination, and it carried. Mr. Engstrom then presided over the rest of the meeting.

A five-minute break was taken following the election.

Martha Hagedorn-Krass presented nominations to the board for consideration to the state and/or the national register. All nominations were unanimously accepted unless otherwise indicated.
