Kansas History as Published in the Press

"Pinneers Paused at Alexve Springs [Marshall Courty]," was one of three articles making up a page of history in the Salma Journal, June 26, 1966. The other stories were: "Central, Northwest Kansas Offers May Attractions," by Ralph Gage, and Tropy Express Once Galloped Across the Plains," by Larry Mathews. The September 11 issue of the Journal contained a discussion by John Schmideleler of the Battle of Indian Rock, a phase of Salma's history about which there is disagreement.

"Blazes 60 Years Ago Recalled—Old Fire Bell Brings Memories of Exciting Theilling Events," by Elfridee Fischer Rowe, appeared in the Lawrence Journal-World, June 37, 1966. In its July 21 issue the Journal-World included a brief biographical sketch of 100-year-old Mrs, Zella Beckner. She was brought to the Lawrence area by her parents the Mark Orbuns, when less than a vear old.

Included in the Summer, 1966, issue of the Mountain-Plains Library Quarterly, Wichita, was "A New Look at Quantrill," a paper presented by Devin A. Carrity before the Kansas Library Association meeting in Kansas City, Kan, May 6, 1966. The "new look" is a more friendly appraisal than is usually accorded Quantrill in Kansas, the author presenting a sympathetic view toward the man he calls "the greatest guaerfila fabrier in our history."

D. Alexander Brown is the author of an article on the Givil War battle of Westport, published in the Civil War Times Illustrated, Gettysburg, Pa., July, 1966. This was the battle that stopped the threatened invasion of Kansas by Sterling Price's Confederate army.

"Alfred M. Landon, Western Governor," by Donald R. McCoy, published in the *Pacific Northwest Quarterly*, Seattle, July, 1966,

is a discussion of some of the problems that beset Kansas in the 1930's and Landon's efforts, as governor, to meet them.

Reminiscences by Mrs. Sadie Hanson, 90, concerning her life in Barton county, were published in the Hoisington Dispatch, July 7, 1966. Her father, Frederick Bott, homesteaded near Hoisington in 1877. Also in the July 7 issue was the autobiography of the late Boy Cornelius, who had edited the Dispatch for almost 50 years.

Elizabeth Barnes' regular column, "Historic Johnson County," in the Johnson County Herald, Overland Park, included a three-part autobiography of the Herald's editor, Loyd Neff, in the issues of July 18, 25, and 28, 1966. Mrs. Barnes' own reminiscences began appearing in the Herald with the August 22 issue.

Mrs. Rudolph Wallace's story of early day life in Seward county was published in four parts in the Southwest Dally Times, Liberal, July 22, 23, 25, and 26, 1966. The A. D. Lambersons, parents of Mrs. Wallace, homesteaded in the county in 1886.

A special traveler's section was published by the Dodge City Daily Globe, July 27, 1966. It is dated January 1, 1878, and includes stories on Edward Masterson's murder, the Dodge City bullfight, the Cheyenne Indian raid in September, 1878, the Santa Fe trail, and others.

Netawaka's history was the subject of an article in the Horton Headlight, July 28, 1966. The town had its beginning in 1866 but was not incorporated until 1884.

Articles in the Minneapolis Messenger, August 4, 1966, reviewed the organization of Ottawa county in 1868, gave some background of the names of Ottawa county towns, and included a brief history of the county's schools by Ruth Austin. An eye-witness account of Indian raids in Ottawa county by Ed Hardy, appeared in the August 11 Messenger, and in the issues of August 11 and 18, a history of railroads in the county, by William Park, was published.
