Highlights of FY 2018

The mission of the Kansas Historical Society is to actively collect, preserve, and interpret state history to enhance government transparency, provide economic development assistance, and educate the students and families of Kansas. Established in 1875, the Kansas Historical Society remains today a vital participant in state government. Families, towns, schools, businesses, and researchers rely on the Historical Society to be the state's memory. History is not something to be put in a trunk for future generations to find, it is instead a valuable tool to inform the present and guide the future.

In FY 2018 participation in agency programs and services reached more than 43 million. The monumental growth in participation has come through a variety of web-based resources

and services. Although many people access our programs in person, the clear majority participate using computers and personal digital devices. Our audience today wants 24-hour, seven-days-a-week access to information. Although the Kansas Historical Society continues to maintain its 143-year-old mission, we have changed our operations to meet the public's current needs. These changes have dramatically widened our audience reach.

The programs of the Kansas Historical Society allow Kansas families to experience history for themselves in many ways.



• On the second Friday of each month the Kansas Museum of History hosted Museum After Hours. Talks by noted speakers focused on the anniversary of World War I and included "The Concentrated Essence of Infantry," "The Great War in the Air," "Bridging the Gap from Soldier to Farmer," "Giant with Feet of Clay: The U.S. Army Enters World War I," "Seeing Arabia: The First World War Photographs of T.E. Lawrence," "The Army on the Border, 1916-1917," "Lawfare in the Great War," and "A Final Goodbye: Gold Star Mother Pilgrimages 1929-1933." Funding for the series from October through May was made possible through a grant from Freedom's Frontier National Heritage Area.




• The Kansas Historical Society has a strong interest in partnering with Kansas corporations. In 2014 Mars Wrigley Confectionery U.S. built its first American plant in 40 years in Topeka. Last year the staff members at the local chocolate company built the world's largest M&M mural to celebrate the launch of caramel M&Ms, made exclusively in Topeka. The 12-panel mural was on display at the Kansas Museum of History.

- As part of our mission to serve the schoolchildren of Kansas, the Historical Society offers a special program for homeschool students on the first Wednesday of each month, September through May. Fourth grade through high school students can learn and explore primary and secondary sources with related activities. This year topics included such offerings as Lewis and Clark, Pioneer Spirit of Kansas, and the Chisholm Trail.
- Each year the state celebrates Kansas Day on
 January 29, the day Kansas became a state. At the
 Kansas State Capitol, Governor Sam Brownback and legislators greeted families from across the state.
 Kansas students in first through 12th grades were honored for capturing Kansas through their exceptional photography. The Happy Birthday, Kansas! Student Photo Contest saw 627 entries from 47 counties. At the close of the ceremony the official Kansas Day cake, made and donated by Dillon's, was revealed.
- Pawnee Indian Museum is the oldest historic site owned by the state of Kansas. A large Kitkehahki (Republican) band Pawnee earth lodge village once stood on the site that includes 22 earth lodge and

numerous storage pit depressions. The museum covers one of the larger excavated lodge depressions. In FY 2018 the agency replaced the shingle roof, the UV skylight dome, and the custom front doors.



- On an afternoon in July the remains of 19 individuals believed to be the ancestors of people of the Kaw Nation were reburied with their associated burial objects. The remains initially came to the Kansas Historical Society as donations and the results of archeological excavations. The reburial was carried out in compliance with the federal Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA) and the state Unmarked Burial Sites Preservation Act and in consultation and cooperation with the Kaw Nation. Members of the Kaw Nation participated in the interment.
- With home offices in Abilene, the United Telephone Company expanded to offer service in Goodland in 1931, with the announcement of plans for a new building. The new office changed over from magneto crank telephones to a dial system. This was the fourth dial system in the state; the first in western Kansas. The Art Deco style building featured Aztec design elements, including a thunderbird on a light fixture; and terra cotta panels and borders on the exterior. The distinctive building was listed in the National Register of Historic Places in FY 2018.
- The Kansas Historical Society contracted with an outside vendor to look at the workflow needs of our preservation law review program to come up with a way to allow clients to





• In FY 2018 the Kansas Historical Society and Newspapers.com initiated an accelerated production schedule to complete the digitization of all Kansas newspapers published before 1923, including an estimated 12,000,000 pages. This involves shipping more than 9,000 duplicate and master film rolls to Utah through a custom courier and updating our newspaper database. We also achieved "open access" to more than 3,000,000 pages of our newspaper content that teachers, students, and out-of-state patrons may access freely without residency verification. This dramatically improves access to our collections and provides key patron communities with easy access for the first time.

• Sherman and Blanche Parks were named to Topeka's 2000 Profiles in Power by the *Topeka Capital-Journal*. In FY 2018 Blanche made a generous donation of her family's papers to the archives. Blanche taught in the Topeka Public Schools and later worked as a manager and director in various state agencies. She was active in many civic organizations such as the YWCA, Kansas Children's Service League, Washburn University Board of Regents, and Topeka Human Relations Commission. This landed Blanche in the *Who's Who of*



American Women. The contributions of her father-in-law, Judge Sherman Parks, Sr., and her husband, Sherman Parks, Jr., are included in the collection. Sherman Parks, Sr., was appointed to the Court of Appeals by Governor Robert Bennett in January 1977. Judge Sherman served as a member of the Washburn University Board of Governors, Topeka Welfare Planning Council, and St. Francis Hospital Advisory Board. In 1988 Judge Parks received the Martin Luther King Award from the Living the Dream Committee. The Sherman Albert Parks, Jr., collection documents his time serving on the Topeka USD 501 school board where he was active in the creation of the Hummer Sports Complex. He also served as director of the 2000 Census for Kansas; as deputy secretary of state: and on the Kansas Parole Board.

• The Kansas Historical Society is a participant in a national project investigating open source software (OSS)-based workflows to help libraries and archives optimize the capacity to curate and preserve born digital content. Twelve project partners have committed to using a combination of three leading OSS platforms in their digital curation workflows. The agency is evaluating the best ways to protect the 100 terabytes of digital material currently under curation at the Kansas Historical Society.

The successes of the Kansas Historical Society come from the dedication of staff members and volunteers who work tirelessly to achieve the agency's goals. We appreciate our partnership organizations that provide us with the opportunity to serve a larger, more diverse audience. The special relationship we have with the Kansas Historical Foundation, their staff members and board of directors, allows us to reach beyond the ordinary. We wish to thank the Governor and the legislature for their continued support. Ultimately, it is the people of Kansas who share their stories and experiences with us and enable the Kansas Historical Society to keep our shared Kansas memory alive.








